Experience the classic look of Swedish Mid-Century Modern Design The Enduring Designs of Josef Frank At the American Swedish Historical Museum Opening Sunday, September 22, 2013 at 4:30pm On view thru Spring 2014



The American Swedish Historical Museum is pleased announce the opening of *The Enduring Designs of Josef Frank*, a travelling exhibition that comes to us from the classic Stockholm interiors firm, Svenskt Tenn.

Austrian-born designer and architect Josef Frank (1885–1967) was a leading pioneer of Swedish Modern design, and many of Frank's timeless textile designs and furnishings remain in production today. Unlike the severe approach to modernism taken by many of his contemporaries, Frank emphasized comfort and informality, producing fanciful designs inspired by nature. Frank's lavish use of bright, bold colors and floral patterns quickly became popular with a host of Swedish designers and clientele.

The exhibition will open on Sunday, September 22 at 4:30pm. A gallery talk will be given by Museum Curator, Carrie Hogan, and light refreshments will be served. As an added bonus, the first 150 guests will receive a coupon for Siggi's *filmjölk*, a popular Scandinavian dairy product similar to yogurt (available in stores such as Target, Whole Foods, and Wegman's). Plus, guests who register in advance will be entered into a drawing to win an original Josef Frank designed pillow, courtesy of Svenskt Tenn.
