11th Annual New Sweden History Conference
The Women of New Sweden: 1638-1800
Saturday, November 5th, 2011, 9am-3pm
At Widener University

Join us for the eleventh installment of the New Sweden History Conference, an annual forum on the latest research about New Sweden for the general public, to be held in Latham Hall at Widener University in Chester, PA. This year's topic, "The Women of New Sweden: 1638-1800", focuses on the social and political roles played by women of various ethnicities in the Delaware Valley from the mid-17th through the 18th century.

Four scholars from Sweden and the United States will examine the subject from different angles, with lecture topics ranging from Swedish-Lenape relations to the role of women in New Sweden church and government. The conference program is as follows:

Jean R. Soderlund, "Negotiating Three Governments: Armgard Printz's Role in South River Society."
