For many, the act of creating is not only a form of expression but also a vital tool for recovery. In a supportive community, they learn new skills, share their stories, and gain the confidence to envision a brighter future.

Both ASHM and SEAMAAC are excited to showcase the incredible work created in SEAMAAC's workshops, including collaborative pieces in painting and Shibori textile art, as well as individual works in batik, mosaic, and ceramic tableware. For many of these artists, this exhibition marks their first opportunity to share their work publicly. Thank you for joining us in celebrating resilience through art!

SEAMAAC CEO, Thoai Nguyen says of the upcoming exhibit,

"Through the Eyes of Philadelphia's New Americans: Art, Resilience, and Community is a project highlighting the stories and experiences of our newest Americans. In the creative tradition and the long history of immigrants in America, from Swedish immigrants in the 1640s, to Irish and Italian Immigrants in the 1800s, this project aims to honor perspectives from Philadelphia's newest denizens. SEAMAAC is honored to partner with ASHM in presenting these fresh perspectives, adding to our rich tapestry and the true ideals of America."

Visit the American Swedish Historical Museum to learn the forgotten history of Swedes in Philadelphia. Built in 1926 during the Sesquicentennial, the Museum has a unique interior divided into a dozen galleries designed to highlight Scandinavian influences in America. The galleries explore a range of topics including the New Sweden Colony, women's history, scientific innovations, and Swedish craft arts. ASHM hosts a variety of programs from Swedish holiday celebrations to history lectures to family programs.

The American Swedish Historical Museum welcomes everyone to explore cultural identity through stories of Swedes and all Scandinavians and to connect with a vibrant community dedicated to preserving and interpreting culture through celebrations, exhibitions, and opportunities to learn, experience, and grow.
