WE'RE MAKING PROGRESS

What is an annual report if not a presentation of progress? Reflecting on the Museum's progress as an organization in the past year, I see it falling into two categories: outreach and planning.

We are successfully extending our reach. Exhibitions have always been a way we or any museum try to reach new communities. *Radically Marimekko* was certainly successful in that respect—it was our most highly attended exhibition in the last decade! It's continuing to help us reach a broader audience through a popular YouTube tour and a traveling version of the exhibition, which opened in Chicago in August 2024. But we did so much more



this year to reach broader and diverse audiences. We continue to innovate with our programming. We instituted Free Second Sundays, attracting casual park users to visit for the first time. We have created a more welcoming outdoor environment with new plantings, a sculpture installed outside, and outdoor seating encouraging more people to spend time enjoying our property. And more and more, whether it is for the local police district, park groups, or local organizations, our facility is being used as a gathering place.

The progress that is more difficult to see is the investment of time, creativity, and resources that goes into turning dreams and ideas for the future into tangible plans to move forward. The Board of Governors adopted a strategic plan for 2024-2030. The Museum also received two generous gifts specifically targeted to help us plan for our Centennial in 2026. The first was a planning grant from the Philadelphia Funders Collaborative to help us plan our exhibitions for that pivotal year for everyone in Philadelphia (and the USA!). The second was a very generous gift from Paul Muther and Ulla Dagert-Muther which underwrote the cost of hiring talented professionals from Fairmount Consulting to help us evaluate how much money we can plan to raise, as well as how to strengthen our institutional capacity to ensure a successful campaign.

So many of our visions are coming true. We are becoming better known in the community. We are becoming a center for understanding not just the Swedish impact on America, but also the Finnish, Norwegian, Danish, and Icelandic. We are grateful for the board, staff, members, and volunteers who are bold enough to lead us forward at this exciting time.

August 13, 2023 was the first Free Second Sunday at ASHM, and our Free Second Sundays have seen growing attendance in the months since.





ASHM Shop is Now Online: Our new POS system allowed us the capability to add a Webstore for the first time. Our Marketing Assistant Izabell Eriksson Andrén designed and built the site. Our new Retail Manager, Nancy Cesario added items to shop.americanswedish.org throughout the year so that we now have half of the Museum Shop inventory available for customers to browse and purchase online. In its first 8 months, we fulfilled 73 online orders, adding over \$3,000 to our retail sales for the year.

EXHIBITION HIGHLIGHTS

Radically Marimekko

Changing Exhibition Gallery: March 29, 2023 – September 24, 2023

Our *Radically Marimekko* exhibit closed in September 2023 as one of the Museum's most popular exhibits to-date. ASHM saw visitors from across the East Coast and beyond for this special exhibit. *Radically Marimekko* will travel to the Swedish American Museum in Chicago in Fall 2024.

The Radically Marimekko exhibition was supported by grants from Finlandia Foundation National, and the Finnish-American Society of the Delaware Valley (fasdv.org).











Karin Larsson: Let the Hand Be Seen

Changing Exhibit Gallery: October 19, 2023 – February 18, 2024

Karin Larsson: Let the Hand Be Seen was the debut exhibition about Swedish artist Karin Larsson in the United States. Although professionally trained as a painter, Karin Larsson ultimately focused her creativity on the textiles and furniture in her own home. The exhibition, on loan from the Carl Larsson-gården in Sweden, featured large-scale hangings of Carl Larsson paintings surrounded by reproductions of Karin's textiles and furniture. The nature of the exhibition featuring reproductions as opposed to original textiles allowed us to open the blinds in the changing exhibit gallery and let the light in to give the entire exhibit a bright and airy feel. The exhibition invited visitors to join Karin and Carl at their home, where celebrations, quiet moments, and beauty come together.

The Karin Larsson: Let the Hand Be Seen exhibition was created by the Carl Larssongården. It was made possible at ASHM by the Erik Dagert Muther Cultural Exchange Fund.

Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage, and Home 1750-1840

Changing Exhibition Gallery: March 15, 2024 - September 22, 2024

Composed of rare and artful cushions and bed covers woven and stitched by skilled women for their households, *Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage, and Home 1750-1840* has enchanted visitors of all ages with its incredibly technical designs and vivid colors. Methods used to create these pieces include weaving, embroidery, and cross-stitch, and the patterns featured display real and mythical creatures, geometric patterns, and floral motifs of all kinds, among many other designs. This exhibition has been well-visited by textile enthusiasts from near and far, with some craftspeople visiting the exhibition multiple times to study these pieces up close.

Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage, and Home 1750-1840 was developed in collaboration with Wendel and Diane Swan whose collection is primarily featured in the exhibition.



The Sweetest Side of Life: Swedish Candy and Confections

Balcony: Opened May 2024

The Sweetest Side of Life: Swedish Candy & Confections pop-up exhibition has given visitors the chance to learn about Swedish candy from Marabou chocolate, to salty licorice, to the famous Swedish Fish and view a variety of vintage candy tins, wrappers, and advertisements to see how marketing for these candies has changed over the years. This exhibition, inspired by the recent popularity of Swedish candy online, brought in new visitors interested both in learning a little more about different types of candy and in purchasing a variety of Swedish candy to take home. The ASHM Shop increased its candy selection in conjunction with the exhibition, and that larger selection has been very popular.

The exhibition features the collection of Tyler Graybeal, owner of Sweetish – Swedish Candy and Goods in Lancaster, PA. Tyler is an avid collector of vintage Swedish Candy tins, wrappers, bottles, postcards, and advertisements.

SPECIAL EXHIBITION PROGRAMMING

Swedish Folk Weavings Virtual Lecture: Wendel Swan, who loaned 52 rare and exemplary textiles for *Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage, and Home*, discussed the historical background of Scandinavian weavings since the Viking era and, with numerous illustrations, the enormous diversity and aesthetic merit of design elements, color, and weaving techniques of Swedish textiles that were produced for personal household use. This free program was the highest-attended virtual program ASHM has ever hosted with people attending from all over the country and internationally. The talk is now available on the Museum's YouTube channel.

Karin Larsson Virtual Lecture: This spring the preeminent Karin Larsson author, Eva Sundström gave a very well-attended lecture from Sweden over Zoom. Eva investigated Karin's inspiration and her textile art and clothing from a textile and fashion research point of view, considering Karin's personal choice of material, her individual combination of varying techniques, and her way of adapting fashions of the time.

Craft Night Out Flower Arranging: Inspired by the floral patterns of Swedish Folk Weavings for Marriage, Carriage and Home, Kristin Pickell of Pickells and Posies led a guided class on how to make your floral arrangements pop. Participants were wowed by the full sensory experience of the flowers and learned the best tricks for keeping flowers looking fresh for weeks. ASHM Auxiliary President and volunteer, Dawn Gould, provided handmade Swedish baked goods for the group to enjoy.





NEW PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Free Second Sundays

A highlight of the first year of our Free Second Sundays initiative was our Free Family event days. In November, about 40 children and their families participated in the event, co-sponsored by the Philadelphia School District's Meet Me at the Museum program, with activities themed around the *Karin Larsson: Let the Hand Be Seen* exhibition. The Friends of FDR Park partnered with ASHM in April for an Earth Day-themed program with solar printing and typewriter seed paper poetry activities. We were excited to serve over 50 kids—more than double the attendance of any previous Earth Day event at the Museum!



Rambo Cider & Events

Thanks to a partnership with Liquid Alchemy Beverage in Wilmington Delaware, we were able to harvest the Rambo apples that grow on the heritage breed trees on the Museum's property to create a new hard cider, Rambo's Revival – New Sweden Apple & Lingonberry Cider!

In October we launched the cider at ASHM with a lecture from Herbert Rambo on the history of the trees and the Rambo family followed by a talk on the apple cider-making process by Liquid Alchemy co-founder Jeffrey Cheskin. A Quiz Night and Tasting was held in Wilmington, Delaware for a completely packed



tasting room with over 50 people in attendance! The cider was an overwhelming success, and Liquid Alchemy looks forward to partnering to produce the limited batch again next year.

New England Trip

ASHM hosted a fall trip to New England to explore the colorful world of textiles. The tour group visited Old Sturbridge Village and Historic Deerfield Village in Massachusetts, as well as world-renowned Swedish weaver Helena Hernmarck's studio in Connecticut and the Vävstuga Weaving School in Massachusetts to learn from textiles experts Becky Ashenden and Monica Hallén. The travelers even had the opportunity to stop by the the Big E Festival, New England's Great State Fair and the largest agricultural event on the eastern seaboard for all kinds of fall fun.



Gamla Stan Market Virtual Tour

In December, ASHM took a virtual trip to Gamla Stan Julmarknad! Participants from all over the US explored the famous old city Christmas Market live from their own homes, guided by former ASHM Marketing Assistant Izabell Eriksson Andrén.

Christmas Around the World at Lemon Hill Mansion

ASHM was invited to help create a room devoted to Swedish holiday traditions at Lemon Hill Mansion in East Fairmount Park. The theme for their first holiday display since their major renovation project was "Winter Around the World," featuring the seasonal traditions of several international cultures. ASHM Auxiliary President Dawn Gould represented the Museum at their Sweden Day celebration by providing an interactive heart ornament craft and pepparkakor cookies to sample.

Social Media

Youtube: The *Radically Marimekko* exhibition tour was published on YouTube on May 14th and quickly became the most successful video in the Museum's history. The tour now has nearly 5000 views, 4000 more views than any video ever published to the ASHM Youtube channel.

TikTok: TikTok is a fairly new platform for the Museum,

but we had some success following viral trends on the site this year. In early 2024, Swedish candy tasting

became a popular trend on TikTok. The Museum took this opportunity to create TikToks about Swedish candy in the ASHM Shop and later about the Swedish Candy balcony exhibition, These videos were viewed thousands of times and led new visitors to come to the Museum to purchase candy and see the exhibit.

Facebook & Instagram: We have been able to engage more with our Facebook and Instagram audience with posts about Swedish holidays and traditions. Our posts about Swedish Waffle Day in March, Pea Soup in January, and Pippi Longstocking for International Children's Book Day in April were some of the post popular posts of the year. Our audience is also engaged in the goings-on of the Museum, especially new events like the announcement of the new Rambo Apple Cider in August or ASHM Winning Best Museum in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* in April.








No-Cost Programs

Summer Library Programs


Expenses

The Sunworshipper

Through the generosity of SWEA New Jersey and Museum supporters, Ida Thoresen's sculpture *Soldyrkaren*, or the Sun Worshipper, has been cleaned and put on display. The statue came to the Museum in the 1930s, officially entering the Museum's collection in 1938. The statue sat in the alcove of the Grand Hall stairs during the Museum's early years, but has been in storage for decades. Thanks to the work of Adam Jenkins Conservation, the Sunworshipper is now much closer to the sun, displayed outside in the Museum's east arcade.
